Don't dig into danger—call 811 before digging

Beneath that lovely lawn of yours may rest a variety of buried utilities. Cable TV, water, natural gas and electric lines could all be present. Digging into gas or electric lines could lead to severe injury. So don't take a chance. Call 811 two business days (not counting the day you call) before you dig. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Utility-owned lines are marked for free.

Be safe and save energy: Set water heater to 120 degrees

Washington state law recommends that residential water heaters be set no higher than 120 degrees Fahrenheit, or on the low setting. This will prevent scalding accidents and save energy.
